6THAGM(KISM)/28/04/2023/01: PRELIMINARIES

1.1 PRAYER

The meeting began at 2.30 pm with the Supply Chain Prayer.

1.2 OPENING AND WELCOME NOTE BY THE CHAIRMAN

- a. The Chairperson of the Council thanked the Members for taking the time to attend the meeting.
- b. He added that this was the 6th Annual General Meeting (AGM) of the Institute and the first for the newly elected Council. It was also the second time that the Annual General Meeting was being conducted in a hybrid setting with members present both physically and virtually to ensure inclusivity and participation.
- c. He looked forward to a fruitful and productive discussion with members.

1.3 CONFIRMATION OF QUORUM

The Secretary confirmed that a quorum had been met to convene the AGM with 237 members virtually and 15 members physically present at the start of the meeting. The quorum for the Annual General Meeting is 100 members.

1.4 READING OF THE NOTICE



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The Secretary read out the AGM Notice and confirmed that the same had been circulated via the dailies duly notifying members of the meeting on 21st February 2023 and via email the same day. An amended notice was circulated to members on 7th March 2023 with an inclusion of agenda item 8 (AOB).

The planned AGM scheduled for 21st April 2023 was postponed after the day was declared a public holiday thus rescheduling the AGM to Friday, 28 April 2023, a change of notice was circulated and a subsequent one also circulated for a change of venue from KICC to Bomas of Kenya due to a state function.

6THAGM(KISM)/28/04/2023/04: CONFIRMATION OF THE MINUTES OF THE 5TH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING HELD ON 22ND APRIL 2022

The minutes of the 5th Annual General Meeting were approved as proposed by Sang Kiprop (Member No. 72974) and seconded by Dismus Kuyee (Member No. 76740).

6THAGM(KISM)/28/04/2023/05: MATTERS ARISING FROM THE 5TH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING HELD ON 22ND APRIL 2022

Noted that:

- The request on settlement of pending bills to Contractors of KISM Towers by the National Treasury was still pending with appeals made to the Cabinet Secretary for consideration. The National Treasury was considering the request in preparation for the 2023/2024 budget.
- 2. Compliance audits were undertaken in Quarter 1 of the year 2023.
- 3. The Council elections for the year 2023 were conducted electronically in line with the approved regulations.
- 4. Sensitization of the disciplinary instruments was undertaken by the Committee to the general public and the membership.
- 5. The Public Relations and Communications Policy was still not complete awaiting input from public relations professionals noting the gap in expertise currently at the Institute.
- 6. The Service Charter has been presented for Council approval and would be circulated to the membership once approval is received.
- 7. The Regional Chapter Policy sensitization was scheduled for the 2nd Quarter of 2023.
- 8. Implementation of the CPD and accreditation policy was not undertaken due to concerns raised by some licensed firms to the Competition Authority.



- 9. The Human Resource Instruments were approved by SCAC and the Institute was categorized as a state corporation with approved salary structures.
- 10. The Supply Chain Management (SCM) Bill 2021 was still at the draft stage.
- 11. The adoption of general regulations for the conduct of the annual and special general meetings was not done due to the limited time in the development of the regulations which was further hampered by preparations for the Council elections.

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6TH AGM(KISM)/28/04/2023/06: CHAIRMAN'S REPORT FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 2022

The Chairman's Annual Report was presented as noted and highlighted below:

Noted that:

- 1. The Annual Report provided an overview of the impact made through the Council and Statutory Committees, operational and governance performance, and activities undertaken by Management for the Institute in the Financial Year 2022.
- 2. The Report recorded the following achievements by the Statutory and Council Committees respectively:
 - a. Registration Committee: This Committee is charged with the mandate to register and license members functioning as professionals in the field of Supply Chain Management (SCM). The achievements recorded were as follows:
 - i. Overall total number of members in the Institute in the year 2022 stood at 7,708 this number constituted 6325 members, 667 Associates and 716 students, thus an increase in membership to 7708 members from the previous year's 6500.
 - ii. Transition from the Manual Membership, upgrade and licence registration to an online end-to-end membership registration of first-time applicants was complete.
 - b. Disciplinary Committee: The Committee is mandated to receive and investigate complaints related to cases of professional misconduct by supplies practitioners. The achievements of the Committee during the year included:
 - i. Two complaints were received which were submitted anonymously, investigations as to the allegations levied were undertaken and are currently under review by the committee.
 - ii. Sensitization of the Disciplinary policies was undertaken.
 - iii. Currently working on an investigation procedures manual that will ensure a systematic approach to an investigation, and provide a detailed plan on sensitization to give more insights to the members on the disciplinary instruments.
 - c. Professional Standards Committee of the Council: The Committee is mandated to assist the Council in the professionalization of the procurement practice in Kenya. The achievements of the Committee included:



- Organized 26 workshops, 21 webinars, 29 in-house trainings and 3 KISM workshops in support of the CPD program. The Institute further provided other free webinars that attracted free CPD to members cumulatively led to 24 free CPD.
- ii. In 2022, KISM trained a total of 1647 individuals through in-house training. 37 workshops were held for 26 different organizations.
- iii. In addition, the Institute accredited other partners to offer CPD training to meet the minimum requirements of 24 CPD.
- iv. Sought strategic collaborations with key state entities such as the Public Procurement Regulatory Authority (PPRA) and the Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission (EACC) which were under review.
- v. An expression of interest was done in November 2022 to expand the trainer's database and ensure the Institute is equipped with trainers with expertise within a wide spectrum of supply chain. The Institute received 150 applications from interested trainers and a virtual training of trainers (ToT) was conducted.
- vi. A team of eight trainers was constituted to support in development of the KISM CPD workshop course outline, followed by a three-day workshop to review the course outline.
- vii. Revision of CPD policy was underway.
- viii. Automation of Workshop Registration and Award of CPD points.
- ix. The KISM Spurs SCM Excellence Awards categories were eighteen (18).
- x. The Council in October 2022 approved the reduction of webinar costs from KSh.2,000 to KSh.1,500 in comparison with other professional bodies
- d. Corporate Affairs Committee of the Council: The Committee is tasked with oversight over Governance aspects of the Institute focusing on Financial and Human Resource Optimization. The achievements highlighted were as follows:
 - Categorization of the Institute at PC 6C through National Treasury and approval of HR Instruments (HR Manual, Career guidelines and Organization Structure, grading and Staff Establishment)



- ii. The institute onboarded three members of staff: the Corporate Secretary/Manager, Legal Services, Supply Chain Manager, Human Resource and Administration Manager and Finance Officer.
- iii. The Institute carried out a performance appraisal in the year 2022. The evaluation was done and the Reward, Recognition and sanction Policy would be applied to the results achieved. The Performance targets for 2023 have been signed by the Appraisees and the supervisors.
- iv. Staff were given opportunities for learning and development. The institute also carried out Training Needs Assessments (TNA) for 2023
- v. The Internal policies approved by the Council in 2022 were as follows:
 Organizational structure and staff establishment; Human Resource
 Procedures Manual; Career Progression Guidelines; Financial
 Management and Procedures Manual; Procurement and Asset Disposal
 Policy; Code of Conduct for Staff; Sexual Harassment Policy; Reward,
 Recognition and Sanction Policy
- vi. The Institute's performance for the year up to December 2022 recorded a gross surplus of 38.6M against an expected surplus of 4.4M realising growth of 716%. The annual financial statements and their accompanying notes for the period ended 31st December 2022 have been submitted to the Office of the Auditor General in preparation for review.
- vii. As at the end of period December 2022, the Institute closed with a total of Ksh 121.8M growing from 79M for a similar period in 202.
- e. Audit and Risk Committee of the Council: The Committee is tasked with assuring the effectiveness of the Institute's operations with regard to the quality of risk management, financial reporting, financial management, governance and internal control processes. The achievements highlighted were as follows:
 - Development and rolling out the approved Audit Committee and Internal Audit Charters
 - Development of the Internal Audit Policy and Procedure Manual,
 Business Continuity Plan, Corruption Prevention and Whistleblowing
 Policy, Gifts Policy and Conflict of Interest Policy;
 - iii. Reviewed processes scheduled in the year 2022, provided recommendations to auditees, appraised the council on outstanding





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matters quarterly and continuously tracked recommendation implementation for sustained improvement.

- iv. Approval of Year 2023 Risk-Based Annual Audit Plan.
- f. Strategy Council Committee: The Committee is tasked with oversight over the implementation of the Strategic Plan in efforts to enhance implementation. The achievements highlighted were as follows:
 - i. Mid-year review of the Strategic Plan 2020-2024 in August 2022 where areas of amendments were identified in efforts to address emerging issues in the Institute.
 - ii. The Institute had successfully submitted a request for onboarding in the 20th Performance contracting cycle. The Performance Contracting Secretariat had already trained the Management of the Institute in efforts to identify areas for incorporation in the Performance contract with the inclusion of the strategic plan deliverables. The performance contracting cycle shall be under the National Treasury as the parent ministry.
 - iii. The Kenya College of Supply Chain Management has been established and is in the process of accreditation by the Technical and Vocational Education and Training Authority (TVETA). Courses to be offered include our own KISEB certifications CPSP-K and APS-K, Chartered Institute of Logistics & Transportation (CILT) certification, APICS/ASCM, VCARE, CIPS, ITC, ICS, E-Learning platforms, among others. The college shall be housed on the 2nd floor of KISM Towers along Ngong Road.
 - iv. KISM Mashinani Initiative (Regional Chapters) through devolving its activities in the regions, developing the Regional Chapter Policy
 - v. Development of policies which were approved by the Council and are now in force: Corporate Social Investment Policy; Stakeholder Management Policy; ICT Policy; and Information Security Policy.
 - vi. Spearheaded operationalisation of mentorship and coaching which was launched this year in March 2023. We invited interested mentors to avail themselves to take the first cohort of mentees through the programme
 - vii. Secured strategic collaborations in efforts to enhance implementation of its mandate with Strathmore Business School; CIPS; Chartered Institute of Arbitrators

1. The Office of the Auditor General stated that the financial statements presented fairly in all material respects, the financial position of the Institute and further added that the Institute had complied with International Financial Reporting Standards and



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compliance with the Public Finance Management Act as well as the Supplies Practitioners Management Act.

- 2. The opinion issued on the Financial Statements for the FY 2020 was qualified on the following grounds:
 - a. Inaccuracies in the Financial Statements
 - b. Inaccuracies in the Statement of Cash Flows
 - c. Budgetary control and Performance
 - d. Late submission of financial statements
 - e. Failure to maintain a fixed assets register
 - f. Failure to remit withheld taxes
 - g. Procurement activities outside E-Procurement
 - h. Unsurrendered imprest
 - i. Lack of Risk Management Policy and Risk Registers
 - j. Non-compliance with State Corporation Advisory Committee Circulars;
- 2. The annual audited accounts for the financial year 2021 were qualified on the following grounds:
 - a. Budgetary Control and Performance
 - b. Late submission of financial statements
- 3. The members present sought explanations on the listed issues that led to the qualification of the books of accounts for the FY 2020 and 2021. The response from the Secretariat was as follows:
 - a) FY 2020 reconciliations have been done and the periodic books and management accounts are in place. The issue was occasioned during the period when the Institute was transitioning to a new system which was now in place.
 - b) Under-funding and the COVID-19 pandemic occurred during the year 2020 hindering our revenue collection and thus reducing absorption.
 - c) The Human Resource Instruments have been duly signed by SCAC and the National Treasury.
 - d) Financial statements for the year 2022 have been submitted within the established timelines and the same was confirmed by Officers from the Auditor General's Office.
 - e) A fixed assets Register was developed by the Institute.



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- f) Unpaid withheld taxes were remitted to KRA due to the pending bills arising from the construction of KISM Towers
- g) E-Procurement; all processes are now system-based; End-to-end ERP system; with the Institute reporting to the PPIP system.
- h) Unsurrendered imprest have been fully recovered from the listed staff.
- i) The Risk Management Policy and standards were approved by the Council on 9th December 2022.
- j) There has been a significant improvement in FY 2021 compared to 2020.
- 4. The Office of the Auditor General in line with Section 48 of the Public Audit Act, 2015 and Article 229(7), would be retained as the Institute's External Auditors for the year ending 31st December 2022.

- 4. The Council should have more forums to engage with members on the many general questions on the profession.
